

The French program of the Department of Modern Languages gives students the skills necessary to **communicate in culturally appropriate ways with French speakers of diverse Francophone communities**. Spoken by more than 300 million people on five continents, French is a globally important language of trade, culture, and political systems, and it's the second most taught language in the world. Courses in French at W&J range from beginning language to advanced topic seminars and immerse students in discovering *la Francophonie*.

Major Requirements

Depending on course placement*, students will take the following courses:

Elementary French I and II (FRN 105 & 106) Intermediate French I and II (FRN 207 & 208) Advanced French I and II (FRN 309 & 310)

Three 400-level seminars

One elective at the 300-level or above Study abroad/cultural immersion experience Capstone project (In consultation with the major advisor and the program director)

Minor Requirements

Depending on course placement*, students will take the following courses:

Intermediate French I and II (FRN 207 & 208)

Advanced French I and II (FRN 309 & 310)

One 400-level course
